Who has a **full stop**?

Example: The boy played football.

Used at the end of a sentence.



Who has a **Capital letter**?

Example: **T**he boy played football.

Used for the first letter of a sentence or for a name.



Who has a **question mark**?

Example: What is your name?

Replaces a full stop to show a sentence is a question.



Who has a **Comma**?

Example: I will buy carrots, tomatoes and bananas.

Used to separate lists or to show a pause in a sentence.



Who has an **exclamation mark**?

Example: Help me!

Replaces a full stop to give a sentence a stronger feel.



Who has **speech marks**?

Example: "Who are you?" he asked.

Shows part of the text that is spoken.



Who has a **possessive apostrophe**?

Example: This is David's jumper.

Used to show a noun owning something.



Who has **Contractive apostrophe**?

Example: I don't think I'll go with you.

Used to show that a letter is removed to shorten the words.



Who has **ellipsis**?

Example: I'm really scared of the ...

Three dots together showing missing or unfinished words.



Who has **brackets**?

Example: He finally finished his work (after taking 30 minutes).

Sometimes used instead of a comma, used around text that gives more detail about something.



Who has a **colon**?

Example: Shopping list: pineapple, apples, bananas and lemons.

Used to show start of a list.



Who has a **semicolon**?

Example: I have finished my work; now I can play.

Can be used instead of a connective.
